Preeminent association copy of this cornerstone of the Harlem Renaissance, presented to Clarence Darrow by then assistant secretary of the NAACP, Walter White, and dated 10 December, 1925 in New York. Secretary, James Weldon Johnson, and founder, W.E.B. Du Bois also signed this copy.


Toward the end of 1925, on the heels of the highly publicized Scopes trial, Clarence Darrow writes in his autobiography, *The Story of My Life*, 1932:

"I had determined not to get into any more cases that required hard work and brought me into conflict with the crowd. I had fought for the minority long enough. I wanted to rest, but....something always comes along to disturb my restful contemplations..."



That something would come in the form of the Ossian Sweet trial in Detroit. Sweet, the brother of Walter White, and several friends were charged with murder for defending Sweet's home against a white mob in the fall of that year. The NAACP took over the case to provide extra funding to the defendants. Johnson, White, and president, Dr. J.E. Spingarn, thinking a white lawyer would be more successful in eliciting sympathy from white judges and jurors, hired Darrow and his co-attorney in the Scopes trial, Arthur Garfield Hays.

The trial ended in a mistrial in October after a hung jury. Darrow then successfully moved for separate trials for each defendant to take place the following spring. In the first of these trials, Sweet's younger brother, Henry was acquitted and subsequently, charges against all other defendants were dropped.



White's sentiment for Darrow is evident in this inscription, "with warmest regard and affection," the book having been signed after the unprecedented achievements in court of a hung jury and continuance via separate trials for each of the men involved. White's son was born in 1927 and was named Walter Carl Darrow after the man who had successfully defended his brother.




Collection of poetry from the Chicago collector and founder of the Centaurs Press, Alfred E. Hamill (1884-1953) writing as Hugh Western. Hamill was also the father in law of the book's designer and illustrator, and founder of the Pocahontas Press, Suzette M. Hamill, later Davidson (1911-1996). Suite Chinese is the first book from the press, published while she was a student at the Art Institute of Chicago. Suzette Hamill was turned on to



fine printing while an undergraduate at Vassar College through Goudy exhibits at the library, the famous typographer also paying visits to the school from time to time. In the Vassar Quarterly Volume XLI, Number 1, October 1955, Hamill elaborates on her founding of the press and first effort:

"At Christmas time in 1937, while still a student at the Art Institute, I published the first book bearing as imprint The Pocahontas Press. Why Pocahontas? Seeking a name that was American, feminine, and related to me, I chose that of the Indian girl who had married an English ancestor eleven generations ago. A son was born of this union, making the proprietor of The Pocahontas Press 1/384 part Algonquin Indian!



...It is of significance that the first Pocahontas Press imprint should be a collection of poems, Suite Chinese, by Alfred E. Hamill, my first husband's father. ...Suite Chinese was a small volume of squarish format, illustrated and hand set by me in Bruce Rogers' Centaur type and printed by George Domke on English handmade paper. The edition comprised one hundred copies, of which only about ten were sold, the rest being given to friends as keepsakes. Happy days!"

This significant and beautiful first book from Pocahontas Press is quite uncommon in the trade. OCLC shows 10 holdings. 500

Tremendous association set of Peake's important gothic fantasy trilogy, inscribed in two volumes to British fantasy artist, James "Jim" Cawthorn (1929-2008). In a prolific career as an illustrator from the early 60s until the late 80s, Cawthorn's work appeared in fantasy magazines such as New Worlds, comic books and graphic novels, and on book covers. He is perhaps best known for his long collaboration with Michael Moorcock, for which he produced his iconic image of Elric of Melniboné on the cover of Stormbringer (Herbert Jenkins, 1965). Shortly before his retirement due to health reasons, Cawthorn cowrote Fantasy: The 100 Best Books, with Moorcock, Titus Groan being #64.



In her tribute to her brother, James Cawthorn: The Man and his Art, (London: Jayde Design, 2018), Maureen Cawthorn Bell writes of Jim's many friends and influences in fantasy world, including Peake

"Jim was a great admirer of the artist and writer Mervyn Peake, and became a friend of both him and his wife, artist Maeve Gilmore."

The inscriptions in these books are reproduced in facsimile in that publication, along with many fine and beautifully printed examples of Cawthorn's work.

The final destination was the Platte River Roundup, the couple having invested in a cattle ranch which they would inspect. The narrative provides an important, rare, and somewhat humorous look at ranch life from the perspective an upper class English woman. The Lady "authoress's" wit, disdain, and superiority shine through the text, despite her overall enjoyment of the trip. In one example, Pender discusses the inefficient horsemanship and unimpressive horses

Charming autograph album owned by young Margaret Warner, niece of famous American Sherlock Holmes actor, William Gillette. Having had no children of his own, Gillette was very close to Margaret, daughter of his sister, Elizabeth and husband, George Warner.

Gillette's father, Francis, bought the land which would become the historic Nook Farm neighborhood in 1853, later being home to Mark Twain, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Charles Dudley Warner, and other artists, writers, feminists, etc. The autographs in this album provide tangible links to both that neighborhood and the theater circles Gillette inhabited.

Hutten, Ulrich von

Hutten took up his efforts in support of Luther in 1519 after being denounced by the Archbishop of Mainz, his abhorrence for the papacy developed during prior visits to Italy. The woodcut in this volume depicts him as a laurel-wreathed poet in armor, and besides his written works, he is known for his leading of the Knights' Revolt on the lands of the Archbishop of Trier along with Franz von Sickingen in 1522. Interestingly, Hutten is also known for being one of the first to describe syphilis, having written of his own symptoms of the disease in 1518.

Early and aggressive reformation tract by the knight-scholar, Ulrich von Hutten (1488-1523). Hutten was one of the major Evangelical publicists of the early years of the Reformation (1518-1525), publishing some 18 separate pamphlets which resulted in 41 printings or reprintings, including 3 of Clag und Vormanung in 1520.



A significant copy from the library of German author, editor, and journalist, Richard Zoozmann (1863-1934). Zoozmann especially collected Reformation era printing and published works on Hans Sachs, Christian Reuter, and others. He also published a book by Hutten, Gesprächsbüchlein Ulrichs von Hutten... based on the original 1521 edition, presumably also from his library.

The USTC (No. 622706) shows 23 holdings for this first printing, 19 of them in German institutions. We identify just 4 copies sold at auction within the last century. 2500

Intriguing copy of bookseller and publisher, Manoah Sibley's (1757-1840) edition of the John Whalley English translation (1701) of Ptolemy's *Tetrabiblos*. As with other works by Sibley, the book was criticized for being inaccurate and containing errors as it was more or less an appropriation of the Whalley text, Sibley having no access to the original Latin manuscripts. Gardner in his *Catalogue Raisoné* states:

"This translation is held in but little estimation and is comparatively worthless."







However, Sibley's importance in the revitalization of astrology in 19th century England is generally accepted due to his propagation of works by Ptolemy and Placidus de Titis through the wider public.


This stunning, interleaved copy contains impeccably detailed illustrations, diagrams, and insightful notes regarding Ptolemy's work. It was likely owned by a learned astrologer of the time, and we posit perhaps even someone associated with publications in the science. It is certainly a book worth further study. ESTC T110939. 


First edition of this important work from pioneering Danish biological scientist, Niels Steensen (1638-1686). The treatise, with its famous shark's head engraving, outlined a revolutionary theory on the formation of fossils. Steensen compared the teeth of his recently dissected shark to those objects found in beds of rock which his contemporaries called *glossopetra* or tongue-stones. The work was also important in furthering the science of

muscular mechanics, Steensen giving a geometric analysis of structure and showing the cause of muscle hardening during contraction to be tension of individual fibers.


